This weekend we celebrate Palm Sunday and begin the holiest week of our church year. Sunday commemorates the triumphant arrival of Christ into Jerusalem, days before he was

crucified.

In the Gospels, Jesus entered Jerusalem riding a young donkey, and to the lavish praise of the townspeople who threw clothes, or possibly palms or small branches, in front of him as a sign of homage. This was a customary practice for people of great respect. For all of us, it is a reminder of the welcoming of Jesus into our hearts and of our willingness to follow him.

Palm branches are a widely recognized symbol of peace and victory. The use of a donkey instead of a horse is highly symbolic, it represents the humble arrival of someone in peace, as opposed to arriving on a steed in war.

The lesson of Palm Sunday is that anyone can have their fortunes, and their lives, change dramatically overnight.

While the lesson of Easter is that God remembers that and keeps his promise to us, always!

Perhaps during this last week of Lent, we could each take time to truly prepare ourselves to welcome Jesus into our hearts and reflect on what it means to follow Him willingly.

"Christ is risen, Alleluia! We are Alive, Alleluia! Thanks be to God, Alleluia!".
